Questions to Help Prepare for a Doctor-to-Doctor Consultation

General Information for All Patients

- Signalment
- Current medications

(Include daily, situational, behavioral and non-behavioral medications, as well as supplements)

- Previous behavioral medication or supplement trials
 (Name, dose, duration given, time given before an event, observed outcome)
- Current physical and behavior diagnoses and differential diagnoses
- Abnormal physical exam findings
- Diagnostic results from the past year
 (Lab work, imaging, urinalysis, thyroid testing, etc.)
- Any relevant advanced diagnostic imaging or tests prior (MRI, CT, abdominal ultrasound, GI-specific blood or fecal panels)

Behavior History

- When the problem first started, how has it changed over time
- Describe the problematic behavior or incident. Include details about the pet's body language during the event (ears, tail, posture, etc.)

Household environment

- Other pets in the home- age, neuter status, species, breed, relationship/dynamics with patient
- People in the home and any relevant relationship dynamics

Interventions trialed

List all attempts to manage or treat the behavior
 (e.g., litter box changes, tools, use of pheromones, environmental modifications)

Outcome-oriented questions:

 What is their #1 goal with behavior treatment? Be specific (i.e. reduce barking at dogs on walks) • Are they considering rehoming? Euthanasia?

Questions to screen for physical illness that could affect behavior

- How many times does the pet defecate per day?
- What is the consistency of the stool (use an objective assessment like the Purina fecal scoring system).
- Is there residue left on the ground after picking up stool?
- Any changes in mobility? (Jumping, exercise tolerance)
- Any changes in thirst/urination/hunger?
- Any changes or abnormalities in gait or posture? (Sitting frog legged or with one leg out, uneven toenail wear, recent lameness, touch sensitivity)

Dog-Specific Questions

Aggressive behavior

- Identify the target (familiar person, visitor, animal, etc.)
- Have they bitten? Did they break skin? How many incidents?
- Describe any interactions that occurred 1–2 minutes prior to the aggressive incident with the victim/target.
- When were early warning signs first observed (growling, showing teeth, barking)?

Interventions trialed

- Behavioral, environmental, or pharmacological interventions
- Response to each intervention

Training history

- Describe the training approach used
 - (i.e. positive reinforcement vs. aversive tools used (E collar, stim collar, shock collar, prong collar, choke chain)

Cat-Specific Questions

Elimination problems:

- Number, size, and placement of litter boxes in the home. Feel free to send a video.
- Scooping frequency
- Frequency of dumping/cleaning boxes
- Covered or uncovered boxes?
- Litter type
- Location of elimination events
- For urination outside the box:
 - o Is it on horizontal or vertical surfaces?
 - o Is the volume small or large?
 - o Does the cat lift their tail and back up to a vertical surface?
- For defecation outside the box, ideally capture elimination behavior on video
